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**LEGISLATURE APPROVES CAP ON INJURED
WORKER ACCESS TO CHIROPRACTIC CARE**

Will Force Injured Workers to Live in Pain

SACRAMENTO, CA – The California Legislature adopted two separate measures today to reform the state’s beleaguered workers’ compensation system. In an attempt to reduce medical costs, the reform package would place a 24-visit cap on care provided to injured workers by a doctor of chiropractic, without regard to whether the worker needs additional treatment.

According to the Workers’ Compensation Research Institute, chiropractic costs are just five percent of the total cost in the state’s workers’ compensation system. “Capping chiropractic care will not straighten out the problems our workers’ compensation system faces,” said Dr. Douglas Wilson, president of the California Chiropractic Association (CCA). “Caps will only shift costs from chiropractic to other forms of treatment such as pain medication and unnecessary surgery.”

In addition to not saving employers any money, CCA believes that the arbitrary cap will have negative unintended consequences for injured workers. “This arbitrary cap may prevent injured workers from receiving the care they need. This cap will limit chiropractic care *even if it is effective*,” said Dr. Wilson. “The treatment restriction will also increase disability costs as police officers, firefighters, correctional officers, commercial truck drivers, heavy machinery operators and others who are not able to take medications on the job will be forced to quit working because of their workplace injury.”

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“While we support improving the workers compensation system, it makes little sense to cap a patient’s access to chiropractic care at an arbitrary number,” said Wilson. “If a patient has cancer, would you cap their chemotherapy at an arbitrary number of visits? No, you would continue treatment until the patient had received as much benefit as possible. It should be the same with chiropractic care. We support guidelines on care to prevent any abuse. A cap is bad medicine.”
